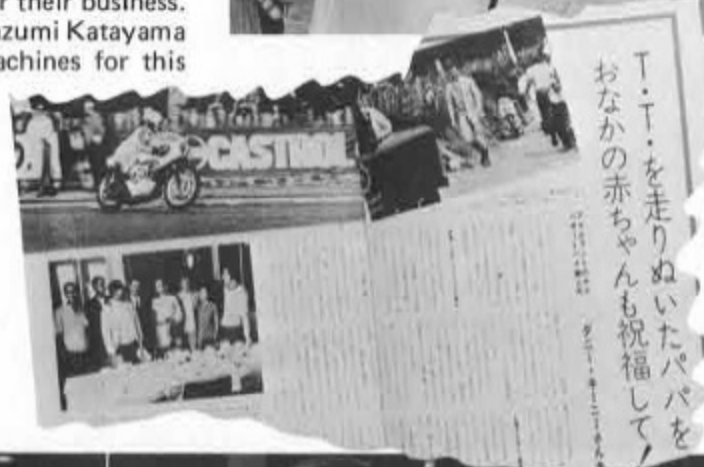
They presented the safety school with a Yamaha trials bike in order to help them make a success of this significant venture. Also, they offered every possible aid for Mick's carrying out a local trials school.

Yamaha MX School

Another Giant Stride Taken Forward — Indonesia



Definitely reflecting a new surge of sport enthusiasm, Yamaha MX school scheme was welcomed by a lot of enthusiasts in Indonesia.

Rooting deeper

As was already reported, the first session of Yamaha MX school scheme which was attempted in Indonesia early this year, ended in a big success, thus providing another fresh incentive to the promotion of this motorcycle sport.

The second (April 6 - April 21) and third (May 22 - June 24) sessions were also promoted in rapid succession so that motocross enthusiasm could root deeper into this country.

Both sessions were promoted even more successfully than before and admitted as Yamaha's another stride forward.

Local instructors trained

Each school held around Bandung, Semarang, U. Pandang or Solo was led by Mr. K. Iwao just like before. His well-thought teaching greatly helped all students acquire various fundamentals of motocross riding. Also, it drew attention that special efforts were directed toward training some expert riders into local instructors who were expected to take a very important role in further promoting this scheme.

At the same time students were taught how to tune up their machines for motocross racing. Using standard or special parts, Iwao converted Yamaha trail DT100 bikes into powerful racing weapons, which also greatly interested them.

More wins

The sales of Yamaha trail DT100 bikes have been rising in a sharp curve since the first session of MX school was promoted.

As a good illustration of this fact, motocross events organized near Surabaya and Solo attracted a far larger number of entries from Yamaha riders, mostly, on DT100 machines. Thus, Yamaha scored much more wins than any other brands. It was most demonstrative of the merits of Yamaha MX school.

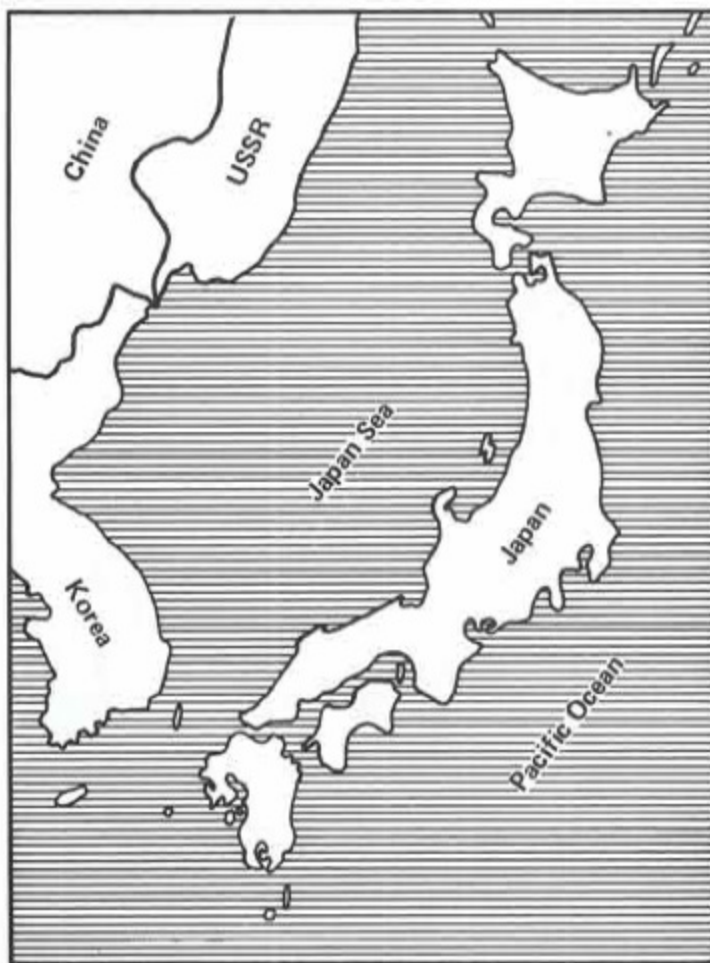

Fishing boats

Yamaha's advanced technology of FRP processing is now fully utilized for the manufacture of fishing boats of diversified types and sizes to satisfy every need of professional fishermen.

It was in 1968 that Yamaha marketed the first production models of FRP fishing boats such as W-16, W-18, W-22 and W-26. These open-deck type small fishing boats were developed for fisheries in the inland and coastal waters as well as fish farming in Japan. The start was never so easy, however. In those days, very few fishermen were willing to switch over to new FRP boats from their traditional wooden ones. Ever since, Yamaha has continued tireless efforts to make them aware of the exclusive advantages of FRP material as well as the quality and performance of FRP boats. Yamaha has now six regional factories throughout Japan, four out of which are specialized in moulding the type and size of fishing boats most suited to their particular locality.

Outboard motors

Motorization on the water—it started rather late in Japan but progress has been steady and something noteworthy. Originally intended for use by professional fishermen wishing to increase their work efficiency, Yamaha outboard motors were designed and constructed with more dependability and better fuel economy plus higher power in mind, above all things.

In addition, apart from the above main intended use, Yamaha models were expected to broaden the area of water recreations, too.

Technical improvements or innovations have been introduced one after another for the past 16 years, basing on ample data fed back to the design department.

The outboard motor factory of Yamaha located at Hamamatsu is the largest of its kind in Japan and turns out 130,000 motors per year, 70% of which are exported worldwide.

The Yamaha 25-II has been winning exceptional popularity here for its all-round performance and exclusive seaworthiness since it was put on sale early this year.

The 100th boat of this model was completed and delivered to the owner at the Nakaze Plant of Yamaha late in May.

100 boats within five months! That was a record-breaking production figure for a single sailboat model in Japan.

Also, it was one of the most unusual cases even in the world.

The Yamaha 25-II is designed and constructed with versatile leisure or sport use in mind. Among noteworthy features are a tumble home hull, minus-camber side deck, one-room cabin, larger sail, etc.

The newly unveiled prototype racing model is clearly demonstrative of Yamaha's serious efforts for 3/4 ton class racing.

Yamaha's basic design aim was to develop a real raceworthy yet comfortable boat.

The boat nicknamed "Magician III" after its bigger sister "Magician II" thoroughly embodies it in a highly successful way.

Featuring a race-bred V-shape hull, it is designed more beamy with longer waterline and larger sail than any other boats of the same class so that it can negotiate varying conditions on the sea better and smoother.

**M. Andrews Shows
His Real Ability**

— Round 7, Italy —

Mick Andrews riding a 360cc Yamaha scored a world championship win for the first time this year.

Mick thoroughly showed his real ability, negotiating the worst rockery route established around Valla dei Mulini in Northern Italy.

It was an extremely stern test for Mick with a suspect foot but he came through it to defeat Finland's Yrjo Vesterinen on a works Bultaco.

**Mick's best
performance**

Mick scored his first world championship win this year at the Italian trial. He has suffered since March with a broken bone in the foot but now it has mended.

Many people spectated at the trial, which was held in very high temperatures. All the riders were very tired because it was a very long and difficult competition, the time limit 7 hours (plus one hour with penalty points) to do 3 laps of approx. 60 km per lap and 17 sections each. The sections were very long, with many large loose rocks and very tight turns of which Mick showed he was the master.

During the first two laps he already established a commanding lead over others by scoring the two best marks of the day. The third lap he relaxed a little but still had plenty of points in hand. Mick's 360cc Yamaha performed beautifully.

Mick really enjoyed the trial as this was the first time since March he had been able to put both feet on the footrests, also the points difference between 1st and 2nd places was quite large.

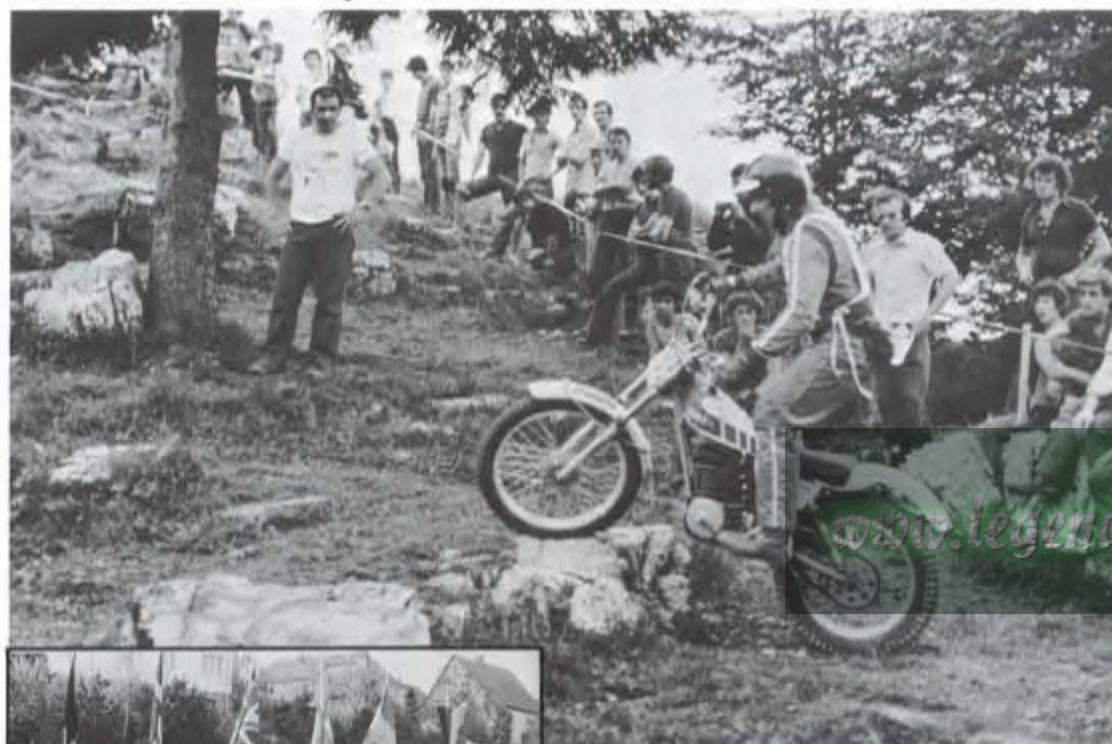

Katayama Wins Mallory 350

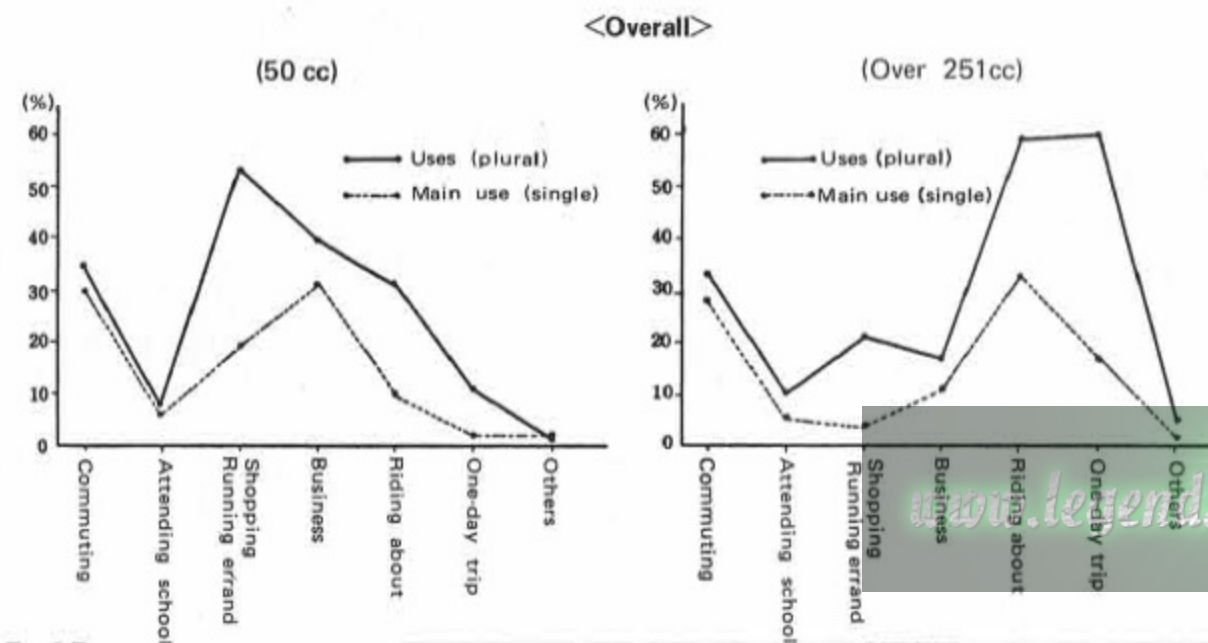
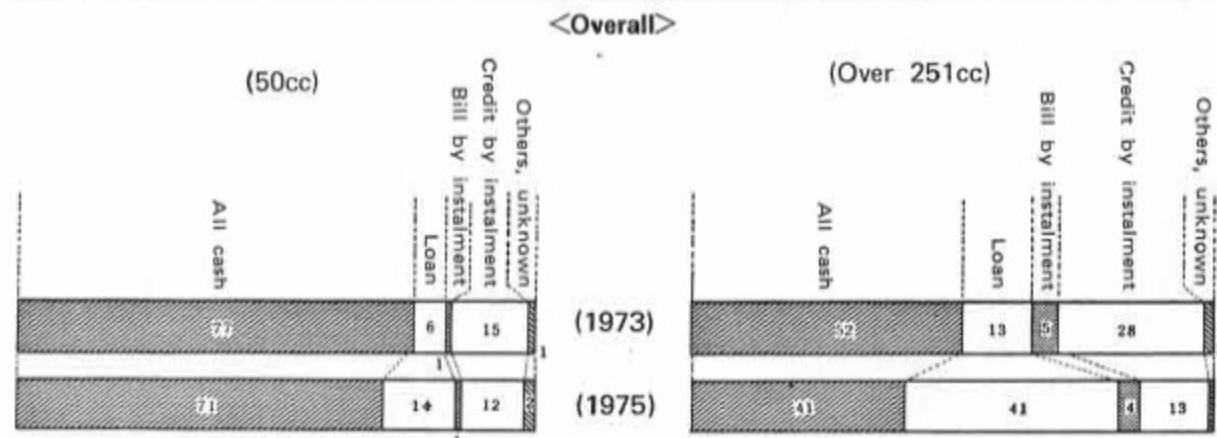
— Post TT Big Event —

How to buy a bike

Survey revealed that there was a considerable difference as to the method of payment between both categories, as had been expected.

That's to say, more than 70% of 50cc bike users preferred all-cash purchase while only 41% of those belonging to over 251cc category bought their bikes for cash. Also, 41% of the latter category preferred purchase on loan.

It was a matter for particular interest that as for each category, the percentage of loan purchase was more than doubled, compared with the previous case (1973).



How to use a bike

The largest percentage of 50cc category was occupied by those users riding their bikes for daily shopping or running errands. On the other hand, a leading share was taken by those riding their bikes for a day's leisure trip, so far as over 251cc category is concerned.

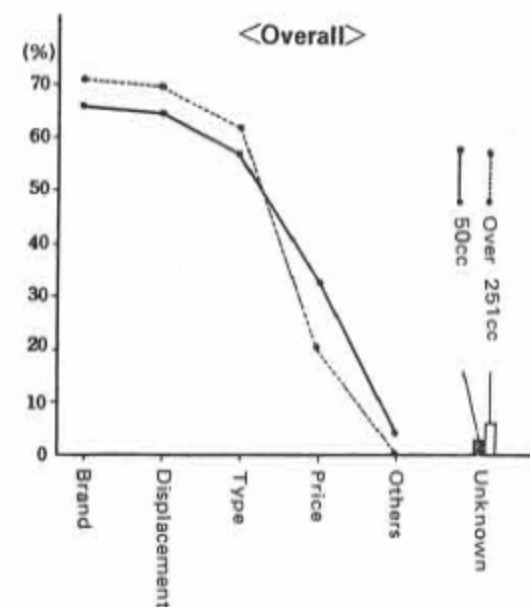

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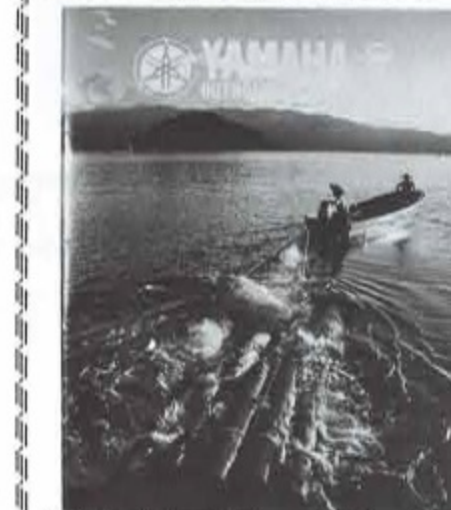


A Wonderful prize – Costa Rica

Race flash from YIC

Hannah notches second 125 victory

Rookie Motocrosser Bob Hannah of Yamaha International Corporation continued his complete domination of the 125 national motocross circuit by scoring firsts in both heats this past Sunday, May 23, at Buchanan, Mich., bringing his year-to-date point total to 100, the highest possible at this time and nearly 30 points ahead of the second place rider Billy Grossi.

Despite his clear victory, all was not easy for Hannah, who did not capture the first

moto lead until the final minutes after getting off the starting line in the 23rd spot. By mid-race Hannah, and his water-cooled Yamaha 125, was in third spot behind 16-year-old Jeff Jennings and 19-year-old, two-time champ, Marty Smith.

It was at that point when mechanical failures forced both Jennings and Smith out of the contest enabling Hannah to finish uncontested.

Hannah's start in the second moto was once again plagued by a roost of slow

riders but Hannah was able to capture the lead near the end of the forty-minute period while Smith followed unable to better the flawless performance turned in by Hannah.

In winning both motos Sunday, the Yamaha speedster has compiled a perfect record of four moto victories spanning two national races while adding a national 250 class victory in last week's competition at Keyer's Ridge, MD.
